What is Do No Harm?

- A tool that helps the user/practitioner to better understand the context
- How assistance and aid interact
 - **actions** and **behaviors**
- to minimize the negative impacts and maximize the positive impacts.

Why Do No Harm?

A community gets most of its livelihood from fisheries. There are, however, many issues with illegal fishing, especially from people outside of the community. A NGO funded the community to do patrols. Much of the NGO money went to a small number of people who owned larger boats. This produced results and illegal fishing declined, but, when the NGO project ended, the income for the people with larger boats ended. The people owning the larger boats had taken loans and relied on the money from the NGO. The owners then started illegal fishing to replace the NGO income and pay-back their loans.

At the same time as the project was running, other people in the community had the feel that patrolling was “not their job”, so did not do it (they said it felt like it was the role of the large boat owners supported by the NGO).

The evaluation of the project, done toward the end of the project, said the project was highly successful – but 6 months after the project closed, there was more illegal fishing than before the NGO project started.

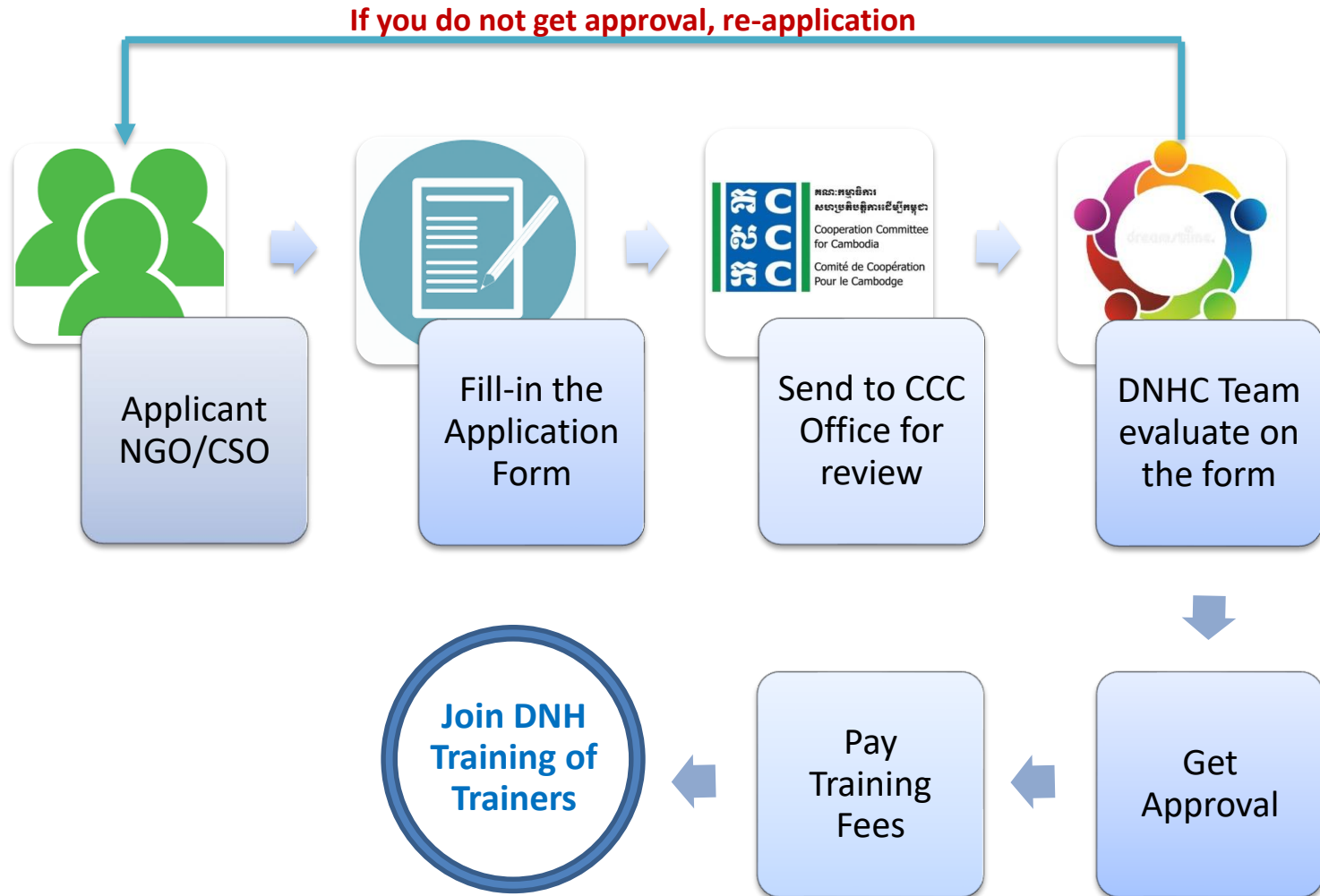
