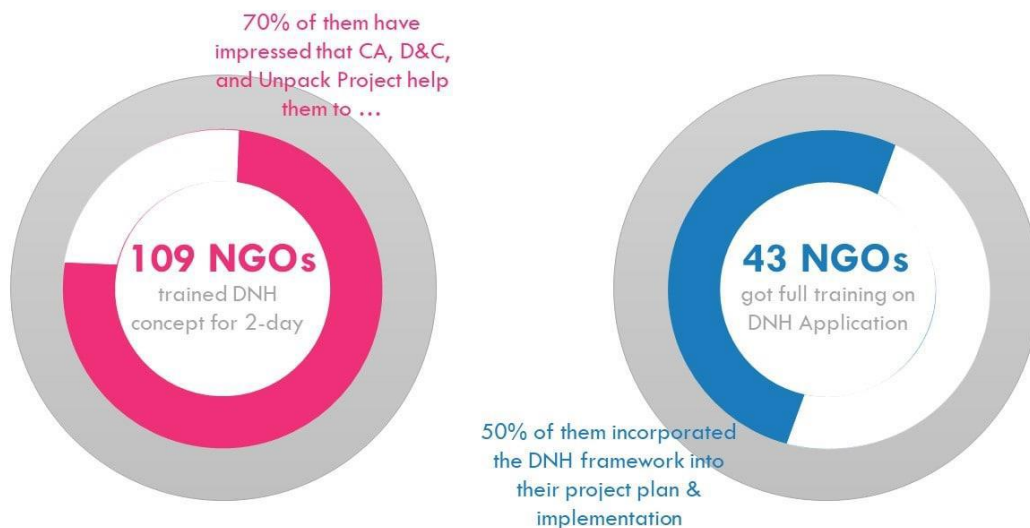
Background:

The Cooperation Committee for Cambodia (CCC) is a leading membership organization with nearly 200 Domestic and Foreign Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) in Cambodia.

Do No Harm Cambodia (DNHC) is a working group formed in 2014 by trainers and NGOs supported by BfdW who are concerned about the impacts of NGO work on local conflict. DNHC team is formally hosted by CCC. Do No Harm (DNH) is one of the key working approaches of CCC's Governance Hub Program (GHP) since 2017 and new theory of changes for 10 years (2021-2030).

Do No Harm is a predictable structured approach aimed at better understanding how aid interacts with conflict dynamics. DNH increases the application of conflict sensitivity in aid policy and practice, in order that projects minimize negative impacts and maximize positive impacts.

Currently, there are 18 members of DNHC team (9 women) have facilitated DNH trainings and provided coaching to 109 organizations were trained on DNH concept through participating in 2-day DNH Exposure Workshop. About 70% of 109 organizations who have involved in the DNH exposure workshop impressed that conflict analysis, identification of dividers and connectors and unpack project help them to predict the unintended negative and positive impacts. And, they are aware that they really produced or/and increase dividers in the community.

Apart from this, 43 NGOs were trained for another 3-5 days to apply or mainstream DNH in their project plan, implementation and monitoring. From the general interaction with the trained organizations, 95% of 43 organizations who completed DNH Application Workshop were able to identify new approaches of their project's implementation through practical exercise. 50% among 43 organizations have incorporated the DNH framework into their project proposal and project plan, and 65% of them transferred DNH concept to their other team and community leaders through meeting and training at the target community.

By seeing the demands of NGOs on the Do No Harm and conflict sensitivity, CCC would like to call for **Do No Harm Introduction Workshop for a full-day to the leaders of the organizations that will be held on April 8, 2021 through virtual platform: Google Meet.**

Objective:

- Participants understand what Do No Harm is, and how the various concepts work together. They can reflect and consider mainstreaming this concept in their context.

Target Participant:

This Do No Harm Introduction Workshop is offered to maximum **50 participants** from NGOs/Associations who are **leaders and management team members**, with maximum of 2 persons per NGO.
